# Alpha particle

Alpha particle, positively charged particle, identical to the nucleus of the <u>helium</u>-4 <u>atom</u>, spontaneously emitted by some <u>radioactive</u> substances, consisting of two <u>protons</u> and two <u>neutrons</u> bound together, thus having a mass of four <u>units</u> and a positive <u>charge</u> of two. Discovered and named (1899) by <u>Ernest Rutherford</u>, alpha particles were used by him and coworkers in experiments to probe the structure of atoms in thin metallic foils. This work resulted in the <u>first concept of the atom as a tiny</u> <u>planetary system</u> with negatively charged particles (electrons) orbiting around a positively charged nucleus (1909–11). Later, <u>Patrick Blackett</u> bombarded <u>nitrogen</u> with alpha particles, changing it to <u>oxygen</u>, in the first artificially produced <u>nuclear</u> <u>transmutation</u> (1925). Today, alpha particles are produced for use as projectiles in nuclear research by ionization—i.e., by stripping both electrons) from helium atoms—and then accelerating the now positively charged particle to high energies.
